





CHRISTMAS HAMPER RAFFLE

Thank you to everyone who donated goods to the raffle, sold tickets in the Co-op and to those who bought tickets. Thank you too to the Leiston Co-op for facilitating the raffle. The sum of £215 was raised for much needed funds for St Margaret's Church.

ST MICHAEL AND ALL ANGELS' CHURCH AT HAWORTH

Worship on the site of the present day church dates back to at least the 1200s and probably earlier. The oldest surviving part of this church, the base of the tower, dates to 1488. The church has been altered, extended and rebuilt several times since then. Patrick Bronte was appointed as Perpetual Curate in 1820.

We visited the church after looking round the Bronte Parsonage Museum. As we entered the church, we were greeted by Christmas carols being played on the church organ. The organ was built by JJ Binns of Bramley, Leeds, originally hand-pumped with a console located behind the choir. In 1975 the organ was completely renovated and the console moved to its present location in 1991, and restored again in 2013.





The font, made from alabaster with marble columns, was given by a local mill owner's wife. The pulpit and Chancel screen are made of alabaster; the figures on the pulpit are Jesus and the two disciples on the road to Emmaus. The choir stalls are carved from solid oak. The reredos was made from Derbyshire alabaster and is based on Leonardo da Vinci's *The Last Supper*.

The Bronte Chapel, in the south east corner of the church, has become one of the country's most visited places of literary pilgrimage. A memorial on the side wall records Patrick's wife and his six children and his own name was recorded at the bottom after his death in 1861. While we were looking at the chapel, the organist played *Shine*, *Jesus*, *Shine*. When he had finished

playing I went over to thank him and explained that daughter Helen had included the hymn in her marriage service. He asked where we lived and then asked if he could play me a request. So I asked him to play *Dear Lord and Father of Mankind* which he did very expertly.
