A time of testing ...

I remember those days of trembling when I went to school on the day of an exam. All the mixed-up feelings, especially if I didn't think I had revised enough. Turning over the exam paper and scanning through the questions, sometimes relieved (I could do this!) or often fear (how am I going to answer this?).

Every year at St Margaret's we observe the season of Lent. A special time for Christians as they relook at the account of Jesus being tested. Jesus Christ, we are told, was led by the Holy Spirit into the wilderness for forty days, he fasted, he was on his



own and during this time he was tested. He was tempted to; misuse his nature (being the Son of God), to deny God and to test God. Jesus passed the test, he did not misuse his power, he did not deny God (even when he was starving).

From this time of testing Jesus came back and started his ministry which was to tell and show people how God is close.

Many people feel tested during their lives. Not only academic exams but also during difficult relationships or maybe at work. Learning how to recognize those testing times, what to do and how to hold on to hope is part of how we grow. Therefore, during Lent, we sometimes join small study groups, read daily passages from the Bible and spend time praying.

The beginning of the season of Lent is marked with a service in church and the day is called Ash Wednesday. There is a tradition where people are given ash which is put on their forehead. It is a sign of humility, a sign that we are going into a time of testing. The ash doesn't stick permanently to the forehead, it soon brushes off, but the person knows they have received it. The ash is made from crosses made from palm leaves. Towards the end of Lent, on the Sunday before Easter, we recall the day when Jesus made a triumphal entry into Jerusalem. Hundreds came out to see him, they shouted praise and some spread palm leaves on the road.

We take strip of palm leaves and they are woven into a cross shape and on Palm Sunday we tell the whole of the account of Jesus being killed on a cross. The innocent being tested to the extreme. Then comes Easter day, the day of wonder. That which we thought was broken, killed, is given new life. Through the testing we are stronger, have more understanding and hope.

God bless you and keep you.

We seek Your blessing on all refugees as they travel, for whatever reason, in an attempt to find a safe and better life for themselves and their families away from their homelands.

AMEN

Lord, ring out all want and despair and the feud between rich and poor, ring in redress to all mankind and a new spirit of hope for the future, especially in this country. Ring out all greed and ring in a new spirit of sharing. Bless the work of the

Food Banks, Christians Against Poverty and all the other agencies seeking to bring relief and advice to all those in so much need at this time.

Lord, ring out all waste and environmental pollution, ring in a renewed drive for protection of this beautiful planet which You created. Inspire all scientists seeking new sustainable sources of renewable energy and new ways of reusing our limited resources. We give thanks for all the scientists, doctors and nurses seeking to bring relief and comfort to all those in so much need for whatever reason. Lord, ring out the grief that saps the mind for those that here we see no more and ring in a renewed belief in Your promise of eternal life. Especially today we ask You to comfort those who have lost someone special during the past year and who are now facing for the first time the challenge of a new year without them.

AMEN

In summary, Lord, ring out all the negatives in this World and ring in more of the positive, for the benefit of humankind and all other living things. AMEN

REVD CANON JOHN TIPPING

On Friday 16 December 2022 we said goodbye to John in a wonderful service at Aldeburgh Parish Church. John had planned the service in his usual way, choosing hymns and readings to reflect the theme of resurrection demonstrating his belief in life everlasting. A full church with family, friends and fellow clergy attending the service - a testament to the love and respect with which John was held; some people travelling many miles to attend.

John was born in Lincoln on 12 November 1942 and sadly died in Ipswich Hospital on 24 November 2022 not

long after celebrating his 80th birthday. As a young boy John moved with the family to Bexhill in 1945 and John attended the local Grammar School, joined the Crusaders Bible Class and sang in St Augustine's Church choir and taught at St Stephen's Church Sunday school. At 18 John felt called to the ministry and he studied at Kings College London (Theology) where he trained with Archbishop Desmond Tutu. John was ordained as a Deacon in Canterbury Cathedral in 1966 and then as a priest in 1967 by the then Archbishop of Canterbury, Michael Ramsey. Elizabeth and John had met in Lymington in 1961 and they were married in 1967 when John had completed his training. There were 800 guests at the wedding and the event made the local papers as John was marrying the Vicar's daughter!

In 1966 John's first post was at Croydon, moving next to Bromley and then Brockley Rise until 1983. In 1979 they bought their first property together, a holiday home in Knodishall and thus they fell in love with the Suffolk coast. In 1983 they moved to Kent where John took up a post at Sittingbourne. A further move to Mersham near Ashford, Kent took place in 1994. In 2001 John was made Rural Dean and in 2003 he was made a Canon of Canterbury by Archbishop Rowan Williams. John particularly valued his links with Canterbury Cathedral.

In 1985 the Tippings bought a house in Thorpness which was their holiday home until retirement in 2007, when it became their permanent home. They enjoyed The Meare, the sea and concerts at Snape Maltings. John, an avid fan of classical music joined the Aldeburgh Music Club, he volunteered as an usher at The Maltings and as guide at Benjamin Britten's Red House. He continues to take services when asked and was welcomed at all the local churches. Leiston St Margaret's was one of the local churches which was privileged to ask John to lead services during our interregnums. John and Elizabeth joined us as members of our congregation on many occasions. They had led a very successful u3a group of church crawlers for many years and this extended their knowledge of the local clergy. During their time in Kent Elizabeth had been very involved with The Children's Society and John became a speaker for the Society and was very active in his retirement, acting as Treasurer for the local group.

In the lockdowns during Covid John and Elizabeth became very skilled in the use of computers to access zoom sessions with the Pilgrims Together church group and the Alde Valley Suffolk Family History Group. Elizabeth continues to take part in both. Following John's passing, members of the Pilgrims Group held zoom sessions with family members and friends. One of the friends thought "this was a singular inspiration. John would have appreciated the virtual coming together of some of the many whose lives he touched during his long and fruitful ministry."

John was a gentle, loving and faithful priest and his ministry helped so many on their journey with Christ. We give thanks to Almighty God for John's many gifts and for the reflection he gave of God's love for us all. John, a devoted father and grandfather, is survived by his wife Elizabeth, his brother Roger, two children Nicholas and Catherine and five grandchildren.



KEIGHLEY & WORTH VALLEY RAILWAY

The railway, run by the Keighley and Worth Valley Railway Company, first opened in April1867 to provide coal and textiles to the local mills. On 30th December 1961 the last passenger line ran under British Rail and re-opened in 1968 as a heritage railway, thanks to a dedicated group of enthusiasts. In March 1962 the Keighley and Worth Valley Railway Preservation Society was formed. This is the only complete, preserved standard gauge branch line in the world. The Worth Valley Railway has six stations – Keighley, Ingrow, Damens, Oakworth, Haworth and Oxenhope. The era of the line, with the exception of Oakworth, is 1950s which is an easy to maintain decade.

At Oxenhope, the first station on the line, a gigantic carriage shed and carriage works have been built. The stock museum has a prosperous look and includes a luxury saloon coach complete with armchairs, a kitchen and toilet. It was specially built for a superintendent of NER. When a former employee retired, he was to have gold watch but instead asked for the coach instead. It has become known as 'the old gentleman's coach' as it featured prominently in *The Railway Children*.

At Haworth, the next station, a large new engine shed has been built. Next is an early Edwardian station, Oakworth. Two years after the line reopened the station was used in the filming of *The Railway Children* and the station was refurbished appropriately for the year 1910. When the filming finished it was decided that the station looked so attractive it might as well remain that way.

Everything is authentic and functional; there is no electricity, only gas lighting. Outside the platform and its embellishments look scrubbed and cared for, with neat flower beds, gleaming gas lamps and old advertisements welded to the painted railings.



The next station along the line is Damens, the UK's smallest station. Several years ago to improve frequency of trains a passing loop was constructed by volunteers near Damens station. Ingrow station has an engine shed and

'one of the best carriage museums in the country'. At the end of the line, passengers can alight and take a train on the main line at Keighley. There is a viewing area which overlooks the turntable. Visitors say it is 'refreshing to visit Keighley & Worth Valley Railway where railway mania is still very much in evidence'.

PHILIP FRNEST HARLE 'PHIL'

In writing this I have had access to the many tributes which were given at Phil's Thanksgiving Service at St Margaret's Church on 7 December 2022. I have quoted from them as the people concerned have said it so much better than I could. Thank you, Sandra, for providing them.

Philip was born on 3 March 1959, the third child of Ernest and Joan, and younger brother to Muriel and Angela. After his dad died when Phil was six he was then surrounded by women. This continued when he married Sandra and they became the proud parents of Emily, Ellie and Laura. However the balance tilted when the girls started bringing home their boyfriends and Phil proudly walked Emily down the aisle at her wedding to Rob. Then, joy of joys, Emily and Rob had their first child, a boy Joel on 6 October 2020. Phil adored Joel and was thrilled there was another male in the family – his 'little man'.



Phil attended Leiston Primary School and Leiston Modern School (now Avocet Academy and Alde Valley Academy). He then went onto college to gain electrical qualifications and worked for several different companies before starting at Sizewell 'B' as a maintenance electrician nearly thirty years ago. He also liked to help out friends and neighbours with small electrical jobs, especially if there was tea and cake involved!

Phil was elected a town councillor on Leiston Town Council in May 2015 and he soon became a member of various committees. He was Chairman of the Leiston Old Folks Outing and ensured that the outings took place until Covid came along and stopped such social occasions. He was always prepared to do his best to help and people in the town knew that if they saw a problem

and mentioned it to Phil, he would do all he could to get it sorted out. Phil was very proud of Leiston and its community and wanted it to be a good place to live and work. He joined in bulb and wildflower planting groups, helped with litter-picks and volunteered at various town events.

Phil was the branch secretary of the Leiston & District Labour Party, which held monthly meetings at The Friends Meeting House, for more than ten years. He organised meetings in a friendly and patient way. When he went out canvassing around the town, although he was knocking on doors and stopping people's enjoyment of television programmes or meals, he met many friends. 'Combined with his commitment to fairness and social justice it made Phil a very special person who will be sorely missed'

Phil, with others, formed the Sizewell B branch of the Unite Union to offer support to all employees on the site, irrespective of whoever employed them. He believed everyone should have the same opportunities in life to enable them to be the best that they can be. He had himself gone to college to get qualifications to gain the skills he needed to secure a job which enabled him to provide for his family. 'Our workplace is a better place today because Phil was in it'.

Phil was so proud of his daughters who all did well in education. He was present as each in turn was presented with her degree. Luckily Laura's presentation went ahead; others in her year had their ceremonies delayed because of the passing of the late Queen. Emily's course at Durham introduced them to the Miners' Gala and I know that Sandra and Phil enjoyed their visits there even when Emily had left Durham. Laura's course in Lincoln introduced them to the Bomber Command Centre and of course the magnificent Lincoln Cathedral.

What came as a surprise to some in the church who did not know Phil well was the place that the Tottenham Hotspur anthem had in his heart. Many of us had heard of his pleasure in the gift of the tour of the new Spurs stadium. He was also a loyal attendee at Leiston Town Football Club home matches.

Phil also played lawn bowls for Saxmundham Sports Bowls Club. He loved to play bowls at all levels, in competitions, in league games and even a Sunday afternoon roll up. He was the Vice Chairman and a Team Captain which meant he had regular meetings to attend. However he was happy to give up his time to give advice to all newcomers to the game, giving them the benefit of his years of experience. 'Simply put he is probably the nicest man any of us will be privileged to know'.

Phil was a regular attendee at church services until Covid and his illness made him vulnerable. He became very involved with jobs which needed doing; replacing the timer clock for the floodlights, replacing the lighting along the path to the main door of the church. A regular task was replacing bulbs in the 'milk bottle' lights in the main part of the church. He was instrumental in the manufacture of the display boards which are used at the end of the church drive to advertise church events. He joined the PCC and joined in discussion in a thoughtful way.

Phil was involved in many organisations but most important to him was his family, Sandra and the girls, their partners and Joel. They were a strong loving unit and are continuing to support each other at this difficult time. Our condolences go to them and their extended family.

Phil was held in high esteem and the full church at his service gave testament to the many groups and interests he engaged in. After the service people were able to share their memories of him and enjoyed the excellent refreshments at the back of the church.

The family of Philip Harle would like to thank everyone who, following his passing in November, sent sympathy cards, flowers and messages of support. We have been overwhelmed by the love and kindness shown to us by friends, neighbours and work colleagues. Thank you also to everyone who attended Philip's memorial service and who gave donations in his memory which, to date, total £952.25; this will be used for the upkeep of our beautiful parish church.
